Mentorship

On past occasions, I have made a bewildering observation when visiting lodges. The officers would talk about a Past Master "interfering" with the current officers' leadership. Why do I find this bewildering? There are two possibilities: one, the Past Master could be interfering, complaining, or just moaning because he does not like the changes made by the current leaders; or two, the Past Master could be offering helpful advice and attempting to mentor the current leaders. The current leaders however, have been conditioned by the lodge's culture to ignore advice that the Past Master might have to offer. Both of these situations are potentially detrimental to the lodge's long-term wellbeing and perhaps occur due to improperly trained leaders. The disgruntled Past Master did not establish himself as a respectable, caring, and thoughtful mentor and probably would better serve the lodge by not speaking out. The current officers who are typecasting all Past Masters in the same broad category of interfering may miss listening to a Past Master who previously established himself as a skilled mentor.

What are some of the mentorship traits of an ideal Past Master? He understands from the beginning that a title in no way makes him a leader.

He uses high-supportive/low-directive behavior to support the current leaders. This approach helps to provide recognition to the new leaders and to help the former leader actively hear and facilitate problem-solving and decision making.

- He shares information about his leadership style.
- He lets others lead when he knows they would do a better job than he.
- He fosters collaboration by building trust and facilitating relationships.

As for the disgruntled Past Master, perhaps he could be treated as a Brother who needs their support and not typecast into a label.

Brother Louis G Moyer was appointed on the ByLaws Committee


The Easter Sunday service of Masons was held at Saint Paul's Methodist Church. Reverend Burl N Long conducted the services.


On March 13th an old style dance and card party for masons and their wives and girl friends was held in the Masonic Temple.

Did you know that Globe is home to a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons?

The "Capitular" or Chapter Degrees of Freemasonry refers the four degrees of the York Rite system that follow the "blue lodge" or "Craft" degrees. The Holy Royal Arch is the final degree and the culmination of the Chapter experience for a candidate. The Chapter is the second body of the York Rite of Freemasonry (following the Symbolic or 'Blue' Lodge), though in some Jurisdictions it is considered the completion of the initial three degrees and is part of the regular Craft experience. All Master Masons are eligible for membership.
